My first GPS was a Garmin portable dash-mountable unit that I used for APRS (Automatic Packet Reporting System) hiking and mobiling. Like me, lots of hams became acquainted with GPS via the APRS route.

Today, GPS is built right into our ham radios, as well as our portable phones, vehicles and just about everything else. GPS is no longer limited to use by techies; "everyone" is using GPS and everyone has a huge investment in the technology.

So along comes something that may wreck havoc on our trusty friend, the GPS. A new nationwide broadband wireless network has received the "okay" from the FCC to begin building a system that will use the airwaves next to those used for GPS.

GPS manufacturers believe that strong signals from this new system could jam GPS and make it next to useless for navigation. A fix could cost billions and no one has figured out who will be responsible for paying for that fix. Meanwhile, the FCC claims that it will block the implementation of the new network unless there are assurances that it will not interfere with GPS.

Since the FCC has already let the horse out of the barn, I am not getting warm fuzzies that all will end well. So stayed tuned!

The Fall Thru Index

The Fall Thru Index (TFI) was developed after several years of study and needs to be included with weather reports and forecasts. This is very important as it directly affects public safety. The index ranges from zero to ten with zero being very safe and ten very dangerous.

We here in Michigan are quite fortunate as the index is normally very low, usually zero. Residents in desert climates are at the other extreme.

How does it work? Clouds are designed to prevent humans from falling thru the otherwise space above. The danger increases when clouds develop holes, or worse, become non-existent. Should one of these holes be over a human, that person will fall thru the hole to be never seen again Just think of people you haven't seen for some time. They probably were victims of fall thru.

They safe way to prevent this tragedy is simply hold on to something. This can be a lawn mower, a golf club, the hand of a significant other or the dog's leash. One important thing to watch for is when you think it is safe outside; wind can blow a hole in the clouds. Should that hole pass overhead, a person can fall thru instantly if they are bare handed.

It is rather simple to determine the index. As are most days, if NO blue is visible, the index is zero and very safe. If NO clouds are visible, the index is ten and very dangerous. Should half the blue be covered by clouds, the index is five. The Fall Thru Index is determined by the percentage of blue covered by clouds.
